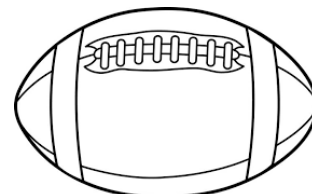
Super Bowl Sunday is February 7, 2021
